How do you measure a year? Do you count off the weeks or months? Maybe it revolves around your birthday, anniversary, or holiday. Perhaps it is the start of the school year or the first snowflakes of winter. How do you measure a year?

At Triumph, one of the measurements is a date on the calendar. May 1. That is the end of one Fiscal Year and the start of the next. As so, on May 1, 2022, we turned the calendar from the 2021-22 ministry year to the 2022-23 ministry year.

Each year, as a part of the turn of that calendar, we stop as a congregation and remember all that God has done.

Psalm 66:5 – "Come and see what God has done, his awesome deeds for mankind!" The Psalmist reminded, and implored, his readers in chapter 66 that God's people are called to remember, and celebrate, all God had done for them. There are called to pause and reflect on the 'awesome deeds' He had done.

This certainly includes us, doesn't it? Days and weeks fly by, often with us in a whirlwind, not noticing God's goodness. We too, are called to pause long enough to remember, to see, and to reflect on His goodness to us.

Psalm 66 goes on to recount and list all the 'awesome deeds' God has done for his people. Which is why God's people were to be a people of joy! They could look and see what God had done for them and look ahead with the sure hope of what He would do for them in the future.

He was their God, and they were his people. And that was a cause for great joy!

This year, we have the new Annual Ministry Update that serves as a reflection point ... a time for us to "see what God has done." This report tells a part of the story of God's faithfulness through numbers, names, and stories of individuals impacted by Triumph's ministry.

Yet we realize that so much of our ministry is carried out daily by all of you as you minister to the people God has placed in your life—in conversations, acts of hospitality, shared meals, acts of service, generosity, accountability. These things happen regularly over the course of a year. And they matter more than we will probably ever know.

One thing I deeply appreciate about our church family is seeing how many people give sacrificially of their time and energy and finances to help make our ministry possible. To all of you who played a role in supporting the many ministries of this congregation, particularly those in leadership, I give you my most sincere and profound THANKS. May the Lord continue to bless you for your service to Him and His church. So, I'd like to ask you a question. A question we all should answer. Journal it down. Add a note to your phone. Write it on a piece a paper and frame it on the wall...

"What has God done in your life?"

If we pause long enough to give a thoughtful answer, I bet we come up with a list of some pretty "awesome deeds."





Mark Hintermeister | A Heart Transformed


I started coming to Triumph over 10 years ago. My wife was Christian but I had lost my faith years before that. This was a major point of contention in our marriage.

Deb Hanson | The Gospel at Work in our City

Somehow, through the "Resolute' sermon series offered at Triumph at the start of the new year, God began a work in my heart to take inventory of the resources, talents and opportunities available to me and to be intentional about reaching out to the occupational therapy students that I teach as a faculty member at the Fargo Satellite campus of the University of Mary.

So, one Monday morning in late January, (after a particularly moving sermon on Sunday regarding the need to use our talents for His kingdom, I prayed and asked God to work in me to reach students, still not having any idea what I could do. Right away, I had an inspiration to put two elements emphasized in our curriculum and in the University together. The Holy Spirit pointed out to me that the Lenten season was already highlighted in the mission of the college and sponsoring church, so would be a good season to gather students together. And since all of the students were occupational therapists in the making, they were already learning about how to help individuals with disabilities to participate in everyday life activities, so they naturally had an interest in the topic of how to best help others, and ourselves, participate in everyday life activities.

With that the "Live Your Best Life" Lenten series was launched and we met together for 7 weeks for one hour per session to explore what the Bible had to say about the topics of leisure, work, social participation, education, self-care, play and rest/sleep. We decided to study both the ideals to pursue and the pitfalls to avoid. I worked in tandem with our campus intern, Tom Houle and my program coordinator, Kevin Anderson to clear the students schedule for one hour a week, over lunch, when no one had any conflicts. We set the time for our first session, hoping that 5 – 8 students might show up.

But to our surprise, everyone came! All of the students in both classes, plus a few online and a staff member and an adjunct faculty, 24 people in total!.

Every session began with food and prayer, as students and faculty were dispersed into small groups of 4 – 5 people to search the scripture and to answer basic discussion questions. From there, representatives from small groups shared key insights with one another on the topic, and we left time at the end for personal reflection and prayer. We did not have full attendance every session, but everyone came back at least 4 – 5 times of the 7 week series. Although I led some of the sessions, our student intern and one of his peers also led, which helped other students to see that they could also step up to take a leadership role.

Not everyone attending was a Christian, but everyone had the opportunity to participate equally in the discussions which led to interesting dynamics. Those who were Christian had opportunity to share their perspectives with their classmates, hopefully setting the stage for other conversations after the study.

Faculty could also see the positive benefit of the study in drawing students together in community. And yes, we did have some gaps, some things we would not do again, but we learned from our mistakes. As a result, there is now a core of students and faculty on the Fargo campus who are excited to extend the series into the fall, with a new emphasis area...and hopefully Pastor Jay, with his background in Intervarsity Christian Fellowship, will help us to raise up student leaders to carry on this work.

What's Next?

Annual business meetings and reports give us a wonderful opportunity to reflect not only on "what God has done", but also on what we can look for God to do next. So what's next? Here's a sneak peek at a couple exciting things to look forward to:

A Summer in the Psalms:

This summer, we will be spending our time in the book of Psalms. To go along with that preaching series, we've developed a 90-Day church-wide reading plan that will walk you through the entire book of Psalms in 90 days. The days on this plan aren't specifically dated, which means you can basically choose any way you want to tackle the reading plan. Why? Because the "win" is not completing the plan in 90 days, but simply reading God's Word!

And this includes the kids! Our Triumph Kids staff have developed an entire summer reading plan (complete with bonus challenges and reading pals!) for kids of all ages. They too can read along for the summer...or you can read to them!



A Year with Jesus in the Gospel of Mark: (Coming this Fall!)

In a world that seems to be spinning further and further out of control, we can be comforted by being reminded that our Lord Jesus is in control of the forces of sin, disease, nature, fear and death.

In a world that seems to be becoming more divided and cruel, our people may be challenged by being reminded that we have a king who purposely comes in weakness and service, not in strength and force, in order to give his life as a ransom for us. And that we, too, are invited to follow after our king and live lives of sacrifice and service.

Spending a year taking a long and careful look at the life and person of Jesus Christ will help us all fall in love with Jesus all over again; or for some of us, maybe for the very first time.

Said another way, the whole story of the world--and how we fit into it--is most clearly understood through a careful, direct look at the story of Jesus.
