20 Years of Ministry in Chad, Africa:

January marked the 20th anniversary of Triumph's adoption of the Bilala people group in Chad, Africa. For 20 years, Triumph has been praying, giving, and sending to this people group to see the Gospel take hold. As we move into the next 20 years, we are excited to see God raising up missionaries from our sister church in Taiwan! The Wen family has recently settled amongst the Bilala, and it is exciting to see the global Church working together to reach the nations for Jesus. God has exceeded expectations.

Finish Well, Together:

And most recently, we are celebrating God's provision in our Finish Well, Together project. As we approached our fiscal year end (April 30), we were anticipating a financial shortfall. We asked our congregation to pray and seek the Lord's leading to be involved in a special year-end fund drive. We were praying for \$250,000. The Lord provided, through his people, over \$330,000! A STORY OF HOPE

When Shanna Knutson started feeling the pain in her back, she figured it was nothing more than the aches and pains that come with being an active, working mother of 7. But the pain didn't go away. And it was getting worse. So last December, Shanna went to the doctor. And her tests came back negative. She consulted with two other doctors and they, too, found nothing wrong. But they couldn't figure out what was causing the pain or explain why it was getting worse.

But in February, a fourth doctor ordered a CT scan which revealed the cause of the pain. It was the kind of result no one wants to hear. Cancer. Even worse, stage IV pancreatic cancer. Her biomarkers, which signal the extent of the cancer, were over 60,000 (that's really high!). This was a grim diagnosis. One which would require an aggressive treatment of chemotherapy.

Shanna reacted as any of us would. She felt afraid, angry, and confused. She questioned, "Why is this happening?" Shanna struggled. But she struggled with God.

As she was in the grip of the threat of her diagnosis, she refused to let go of God. And more importantly, God refused to let go of her. One of the ways Shanna held on to the Lord was by trusting the words of James 5:14 which says to call on the elders of the church, and let them pray over you, anointing you with oil in the name of the Lord. That's what Shanna did. So our West Campus pastors and elders, along with Cindy Rogness, West Campus Women's Ministry Director, and Shanna's husband, Tim, prayed over Shanna and anointed her for healing according to the Lord's will.

Within weeks of praying together, Shanna's doctor came back with some unexpected news. Further testing revealed that she has esophageal cancer, not pancreatic cancer. While this change in diagnosis by no means put Shanna in the clear, it did come as a relief. It is a much more optimistic prognosis and requires a less aggressive treatment.

This is Shanna's journey. And it's not an easy one, to say the least. But Shanna has found the Lord to be good and faithful along the way. She has experienced peace that stretches beyond her understanding and an abiding sense of God's presence with her. Shanna also says that in addition to the constant, amazing love and support of her family, one of the most meaningful ways the Lord has blessed her is through the love, empathy, and support of the women in her Tuesday evening Bible Study. Those women, and their time together, has been a true difference-maker in her life.

At last check, Shanna's biomarkers have dropped to 3,000 (that's a big improvement!). And although there are good days, and much harder ones, Shanna has found the promise of Isaiah 41:10 to be a true and strong reality for her.

A WORK OF COMPASSION

My guitar was slightly out of tune, but for once, I didn't care. My G chord, coupled with a semi-aggressive strumming pattern, was lurching through our living room between the wails of my son.

Within seconds of the first strum, the crying stopped. Those days, my less than subtle guitar playing was the only thing that would stop his crying ... most of the time.

I used to silently (or not silently) make fun of people who would name their kids weird names ... until my wife Addy and I named our son Elo, after my great-great uncle Elo who was a wonderful man of God. Anyways, a few months into his young life, Elo was getting more and more fussy. We figured it was normal, or that it was a season that he would grow out of, but it seemed his crying never stopped. Life seemed hopeless. The conversations with myself in my head constantly consisted of questioning our desire to have multiple kids, because one seemed to be quite enough.

Months previous, our West Campus staff had begun a Bible study on Tuesday mornings, and we happened to be walking through the Gospel of Mark. Right in the midst of those difficult days and nights marked by the screams of my son, we were in Mark 9 in staff Bible study. This particular Tuesday morning, we were looking at Mark 9:33–37. Little did I know that the Spirit of the living God would use these five verses to rock my world.

In this text Jesus is taking his disciples' understanding of greatness, and flipping it on its head. As per usual in Mark's gospel account, the disciple's were doing something quite ridiculous. This time it was an argument about who among them was the best. But Jesus, full of patience and love, rebukes them.

First he says to them in verse 35, "If anyone would be first, he must be last of all and servant of all." Jesus redefines greatness to equate serving. Being a servant equals greatness. He was and is the ultimate example of this (Paul's words in Philippians 2:1–11 come to mind).

But Jesus wasn't done. He then takes a child in his arms and says to his disciples, "Whoever receives one such child in my name receives me, and whoever receives me, receives not me but him who sent me" (v. 37).

Pastor Jay pointed out to us the prevailing view of children in those days. Unless they managed to survive until adulthood, children were seen as property and were expendable. They existed to serve the head of the house. If food was scarce, they were the first to starve. If money was short, they would be sold as slaves. The poor of the community would be better taken care of than the children at times. Their dependence was an annoyance. This was the cultural norm.

So Jesus's exhortation to his followers to receive and serve a helpless, totally dependent child was RADICAL. There was no one lesser to serve – children were the bottom of the barrel.

And then the Word confronted me of my sin. I didn't necessarily think of my son as "bottom of the barrel," nor did I think about selling him into slavery when times got tough, but my sinful selfishness was reigning in my heart, and I had not realized it until reading this text. Elo's total dependence had been a huge annoyance for me, but the Spirit of God had had enough. I praise the Lord for this!

I praise the Lord that He doesn't abandon us to let our sin rule and reign in our hearts, but instead He continually is convicting, forgiving, and transforming us. His grace is greater, and His mercy is more!

Through that text, the Lord was essentially saying to me "Isaac, when you receive and love and serve your helpless, totally dependent son, you receive and love and serve ME." I went home that afternoon with a changed heart. Because of the word I was more patient with Elo. Because of the word my thinking had changed. Because of the word I was able to serve my King Jesus himself, through my son.
